GOLDEN LOTUSES

"We never saw them before, so we cut them off." - in Honda Katsuichi, *The Nanjing Massacre*

On the road next to a little bridge A cone-shaped pile, knee-high with a single small foot at the top. a very small foot as if a child's and yet up close it is wrinkled, gnarled, atrophied the four small toes curled underneath growing back into the meat of the sole. only the big toe remaining exposed,. an acute point like the shape of a baker's icing bag or the prow of a small, slim boat, except or the arch which is raised, or rather buckled into an unnatural ridge where the length of the foot was broken over the length of a lifetime. the baby toe underneath nearly touching the heel itself callused, the shape of a fat mallet.

There are other feet, some equally bare and shriveled, others still in their shoes, gaudily embroidered, even under the soles, images of peonies and ducks in satin stitch, appliques of pink grapes, a blue brocade of butterflies and chrysanthemums, multicolored waves and tendrils, a leaping fish with heavy silver couching.

The mound is stacked with care. It is made from dozens of feet, presumable all in pairs, severed at the ankles or low shins, encrusted now with blood, exotic, once bound, but now freed, now nowhere to run.
